Pupil Premium Report: Summary for Parents 2019-20

What is Pupil Premium?

The Pupil Premium is additional funding given to schools so that they can support their disadvantaged pupils and close the attainment gap between them and their peers.

What is the purpose of Pupil Premium?

The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and their peers by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most.

The Pupil Premium was introduced in April 2011 and is allocated to schools.

Who is eligible for Pupil Premium?

Pupils may be eligible to receive Pupil Premium for 3 reasons

- 1. They are currently, or have in the last 6 years, receiving free school meals
- 2. Children from service families.
- 3. Children currently in care or in an adoptive family.

How much is the pupil premium?

- 1. Free school meal children £1,320
- 2. Service families £300
- 3. Looked after children £2,300 (as at 2.10.18 source DfE)

How many children in Thameside are in receipt of the Pupil Premium?

92/407 = 23%

How much money will Thameside receive this year?

£127,000
